A Humanitarian and Environmental Solution

- 🏠 Since its inception in 1998, MedShare has donated over **\$70 million** worth of medical supplies and equipment in more than **560 forty-foot containers** to hospitals and clinics in the economically developing world. This accounts for approximately **one million cubic feet of space** saved in U.S. landfills and over **2,500 tons of supplies and equipment**.
- 🏠 MedShare has sent forty-foot containers to **81 countries** around the world.
- 🏠 In 2007, MedShare's supply and recovery efforts saved approximately **535,000 lbs. of CO2**, equal to almost **554,000 miles** driven; and **1.8 million kWh**, equal to **150 household's annual electricity**.
- 🏠 MedShare responded to the emergency medical needs resulting from the January 12th earthquake in Haiti by sending more than **75 tons** of vitally-needed medical supplies and equipment.
- 🏠 In 2008, MedShare has collected a weekly average of **10 tons** of useable surplus medical supplies and equipment from both local and national partner hospitals, manufacturers and distributors. MedShare evaluates, sorts, labels, inventories and prepares these materials for shipment.
- 🏠 In 2009, MedShare distributed over **\$11 million** worth of medical supplies and equipment in **76 forty-foot containers**, supplied more than **\$375,000** worth of medical product to **254 medical mission teams** and provided tens of thousands of individuals in the economically developing world with healthcare that would otherwise be unavailable.
- 🏠 MedShare's **biomedical engineer** and **biomedical tech** restore and repair donated **biomedical equipment** to ensure that recipient hospitals have the means necessary to effectively operate the equipment.
- 🏠 In its ten-year history, MedShare has outfitted **over 1,000 medical teams** who have traveled abroad with over **\$2.3 million** worth of MedShare supplies.
- 🏠 MedShare's volunteer corps averages **700 dedicated individuals** per month, many on a recurring weekly or monthly basis. In 2008, they sorted a total of **141 tons** of valuable medical supplies and contributed **over 37,000 total volunteer hours** to MedShare's mission.

FAQs

Where are you located?

MedShare has two locations. Its headquarters is in Decatur, GA, a suburb of Atlanta, but it also has a distribution center in San Leandro, California, which is just outside of San Francisco.

Where do you collect surplus supplies and equipment?

We primarily work with hospitals in the Atlanta metro area and northern California to recover surplus medical products. We also work with some hospitals and clinics outside our primary collections along with many medical distributors and manufactures throughout the U.S. to accept donations of medical supplies and equipment. Can I donate my expired supplies to you?

No, all products must have a minimum shelf life of 12-18 months because of strict customs regulations in most of our recipient countries.

Do you accept pharmaceuticals?

We do not accept pharmaceuticals, but a list of originations that can help with these items can be found at <http://www.medshare.org/services/medical-product-donations/pharmaceuticals>.

Do you accept biomedical equipment?

Yes, we are always in need of biomedical equipment. We have two full-time biomedical engineers who prepare items for shipment and travel internationally to train medical staff on proper use of biomedical equipment. What type of product donations do you accept?

MedShare works with hospitals, clinics, manufacturers, distributors and individuals to receive disposable medical supplies, gently used durable goods and operational biomedical equipment. Most needed are simple items like gloves, sutures, surgical instruments, stethoscopes, wheelchairs, patient monitors, and sterilizers.

Do you make medical supplies available to clinics in the United States?

Yes, we offer a variety of supplies to free clinics in Georgia and California through our Medical Mission Team store. Application for free clinic support is available at <http://www.medshare.org/services/medical-mission-teams>.

How can I obtain supplies for a humanitarian project or medical team trip?

Go to the services/medical mission teams section of our Website (www.medshare.org) and submit an online application. Once your application has been approved, someone will contact you to set up an appointment to come in and pick out your medical supplies. You must have a doctor or nurse sign the application.

How do you ensure that the containers arrive safely?

We develop working relationships with corporations, faith-based organizations and other international nonprofits that have overseas staff and are committed to improving healthcare in their communities. Because these partners have a vested financial stake, in that they have somehow helped sponsor the shipping container, they help MedShare shepherd the medical shipments through customs and to the recipient healthcare facility.

How do you qualify your medical supply recipients?

New applicants must complete a comprehensive application including references. We also require written proof from the applicant's government that it is a legitimate government or non-profit organization qualified to accept duty-free humanitarian aid in its country.

**MEDSHARE SHIPPING MULTIPLE SHIPMENTS OF EMERGENCY MEDICAL
RELIEF AID TO HAITI**

MedShare ships over 8,000 boxes of requested medical supplies to Haiti.

ATLANTA (January 15, 2010) –To respond to the dire need for medical supplies in Haiti, MedShare is sending four 40-foot containers of medical supplies to Haiti over the next week, with the first shipment leaving Friday.

“In responding to the medical needs in Haiti, it is important for MedShare to act quickly, but responsibly. On-the-ground conditions in Haiti are constantly changing, so we must take all the appropriate steps to ensure that we ship these requested medical supplies in the most efficient manner,” said A.B. Short, CEO and Co-Founder of MedShare, a nonprofit that recovers and redistributes surplus medical supplies from hospitals and medical companies to developing countries.

To respond to the immediate need, MedShare is sending on Friday a 40-foot container of medical supplies in partnership with World Help. These medical supplies will be distributed at a medical triage station near the Port-au-Prince airport.

Also on Friday, MedShare is using a donated private plane to ship 55 boxes of requested medical supplies with a team of eight doctors from International Medical Alliance (IMA) to the Dominican Republic. The IMA team will travel to a 100-bed hospital on the Haitian border where 1,800 patients await medical treatment.

“We’re learning that many of the Haitian people are fleeing from Port-au-Prince to other areas of Haiti and crossing into the Dominican Republic. The hospitals and clinics throughout Haiti and near the Haitian border need medical supplies and assistance to accommodate the flood of victims,” said Short.

Over the next week, MedShare plans to ship three 40-foot containers of requested medical supplies followed by several more contingent on funding availability. Kimberly-Clark Corporation is sponsoring a container of additional medical supplies to be sent to the AMA team. MedShare’s Western Region Distribution Center will also send a container with requested medical supplies to Food For The Poor. A third container sponsored by Rotary International is being rescheduled due to port closings for shipment to a hospital in North Haiti.

Once immediate needs are met, MedShare’s efforts will transition to support the longer-term recovery for the health systems in Haiti. All funding will be used for projects in Haiti, with the top priority being immediate support for medical relief. Over the past 10 years, they have sent 36 forty-foot containers of medical supplies and equipment to various hospitals in Haiti.
