Dear Friends,

As the world continued to battle the COVID-19 pandemic, great hope arrived in 2021 with the introduction of vaccines and enhanced testing. Unfortunately, these lifelines continued to be out of reach for many of the recipients we serve. The common theme that continued to emerge was the lack of health equity within marginalized communities. Health inequity refers to avoidable differences in health between different groups of people. These widespread differences are the result of unfair systems that negatively affect people's living conditions, access to healthcare, and overall health status. Health inequity affects people from disadvantaged or historically oppressed groups most severely, but has a negative impact on everyone. The pandemic exacerbated these issues and increased the need for MedShare's programs and services.

Although the pandemic continued to impact the number of volunteers that supported our efforts and our ability to travel internationally to conduct critical equipment installations and training, MedShare was still able to address health inequities at home and abroad. This was evident via our partnership with Philips to improve Maternal and Child Health outcomes in disadvantage communities in the San Francisco Bay Area by donating ultrasound machines to local safety-net clinics. Our ongoing deliveries of medical supplies and equipment were critical to many developing countries that were just now feeling the brunt of the pandemic, and did not have vaccines and PPE readily available within their communities.

Through our response to COVID-19 as well as our ongoing efforts to address health inequities worldwide, with the help of our supportive community, in FY21 we were able to improve the lives of 4.7 million people in 41 countries, including the U.S., and provide \$18 million in aid.

A key component of our continuing COVID-19 response included supporting the international communities and executing an impact partnership with The Walt Disney Company to distribute 1 million children's face masks to over 150 communities across the U.S., including schools, safety-net clinics and grass-root efforts in low-income communities.

Many of our efforts to address healthcare disparities involved our support of safety-net clinics in the U.S. that were dealing with the fallout of health inequities that are prevalent in underserved communities. MedShare provided over \$330,000 in aid to support their efforts. Additionally, over \$380,000 in aid was provided to medical mission teams that filled the gap in health systems in underserved communities outside of the U.S.

Our disaster relief efforts reached more than 2.5 million people in FY21. This was primarily due to our response to the explosion in Beirut that claimed the lives of over 200 people and resulted in over 7,000 injuries, as well as continuing efforts to provide PPE as part of our infectious disease control and prevention program, delivering over 37 million units of PPE. Working together with Kaiser Permanente, UPS, The UPS Foundation, and PATH, we were able to donate two oxygen generators to India during a time when oxygen was in extremely short supply and countless lives were being lost.

We are truly thankful for the tremendous support of the many donors, partners, supporters, volunteers, and staff who continue to help us advance our mission and impact so many lives during these unprecedented times. We invite you to read more about how we're serving our global community as we work to improve the quality of life of people and our planet.



Addressing Health Inequity in the Bay Area

Despite being a region known for wealth and technological advancement, the Bay Area is not immune to the impact of social determinants of health, such as access to affordable health services of decent quality. There are stark racial disparities for pregnant women in the Bay Area who receive early prenatal care, including those in Alameda, Contra Costa, San Francisco, San Mateo, and Santa Clara Counties. Through MedShare's Safe Birth Initiative and partnership with Philips, Safety Net clinics like Axis Community Health

were given the ability to extend quality maternity and neonatal care in their communities and take a step closer to birth equity via a donation of state of the art ultrasound imaging equipment.

Our community deserves the same kind of health technologies found in private hospitals and working with MedShare, we have been able to expand our ability to provide quality prenatal care. To receive this donation on Mother's Day makes it even more meaningful.

Beirut Explosion Response

On August 4, 2020, a large amount of ammonia nitrate stored at the Port of Beirut in the capital city of Lebanon exploded causing over 200 deaths, 7,000 injuries and over \$15 billion in property damage. The criticality of the situation was compounded by COVID-19 and the fact that all major hospitals had either been destroyed or rendered non-operational from the explosion. MedShare partnered with Caring for Beirut, Project Hope and others to deliver over \$300,000 of critical equipment and supplies, including PPE, to treat over 75,000 patients, and to help hospitals regain functionality.

Without MedShare's urgent response, the situation would have taken truly catastrophic proportions.

Oxygen Saves Lives in India

This past spring the country of India underwent a massive surge in COVID-19 cases, almost exclusively as a result of the rapid spread of the Delta variant. The most critically needed item to sustain the lives of many patients stricken with COVID-19 was medical oxygen. In response to this critical need, MedShare coordinated the delivery of two oxygen generator plants in partnerships with Kaiser Permanente, The UPS Foundation, UPS and PATH India.

Addressing Primary Care and COVID-19 in Madagascar

MedShare partnered with PIVOT to provide primary care and PPE to under-resourced communities in Madagascar. PIVOT combines accessible and comprehensive health care services with rigorous scientific research to save lives and break cycles of poverty and disease. In addition to providing general care supplies and equipment, the donation included over 16,000 face masks and 107,000 units of PPE to help address emerging COVID-19 issues.

Addressing Pediatric Surgery Needs in Honduras

MedShare partnered with World Pediatric Project (WPP) to address the pediatric surgery gap in Honduras. Critical supplies and orthopedic instruments were donated to World Pediatric Project medical volunteers Dr. Rachel Thompson and Dr. Tony Scaduto (both from UCLA's Orthopedic Institute for Children). This donation provided pediatric surgery support to Ruth Paz Hospital in San Pedro Sula, Honduras to treat children with spine conditions as well as general orthopedic needs. MedShare equipped the team with over \$140,000 worth of small fragment

surgical orthopedic sets that had been donated to MedShare by DePuy Synthes, a Johnson & Johnson Company.

World Pediatric Project is so grateful for partners like MedShare who provide us with high-quality, specialized orthopedic implants, without which we would not be able to reach as many children.

Providing Rehabilitation Care in Underserved Communities

The Georgia RSVP Clinic is dedicated to providing free outpatient rehabilitation care that maximizes independence, wellness, and community participation for people with brain and spinal cord injuries who do not have benefits for rehabilitation. There are only two other clinics like them through the entire country. MedShare provided supplies such as wound care products that clients can use on an ongoing basis, saving both financial resources and creating better health outcomes.

In their first year of operations, they have treated 23 patients, including:

- 16 spinal cord injuries
- 5 brain injuries
- 2 stroke patients

Biomedical Training Continues Virtually Despite Pandemic

Despite international travel restrictions due to COVID-19, MedShare's Biomedical Training and Repair Service team continued to provide training and support to healthcare personnel, engineers and end-users locally and globally to ensure that lifesaving biomedical equipment could still be utilized and sustained to treat more patients. The team provided training locally to 27 Georgia Tech engineers resulting in 2,400 pieces of equipment repaired, and also provided over 300 hours of virtual training to 32 healthcare workers in 6 hospitals in Nigeria, with 40 pieces of equipment installed, 8 pieces of equipment repaired, and a ventilator built. The ventilator was built via remote collaboration between MedShare and the biomedical team of Obafemi Awolowo University Teachings Complex in Osun, Nigeria, utilizing simple parts that were sourced locally. Many lives were saved, and continue to be saved, through the team's dedication, innovation and collaboration.

The diagnosis and training provided by MedShare on the ultrasound machine enabled the engineer here to follow and learn. After the training he was confident about his ability to keep this machine going.

A Tribute to "Doc"

During 2021, MedShare lost its most tenured staff member, Dr. Moctar Bayor, affectionally known as "Doc". Doc began his career at MedShare on March 5, 2001, and left a legacy of courage, community service and passion for MedShare's mission.

Doc was originally from Togo, West Africa. He received a full scholarship to study in Russia to become a medical doctor. He was forced to leave Togo as a political refugee, and this experience inspired him to treat patients at a refugee camp in Ghana for eight years. He was the only medical doctor for 43,000 people seeking refuge there. He eventually left Ghana, again as a political refugee, and travelled to the United States through the United Nations. Dr. Bayor recently celebrated 20 years with MedShare, working in Volunteer Programs to manage volunteers supporting our mission through daily community service projects. He continued to travel on mission trips to Ghana, Togo, Haiti, Kenya, and Nigeria to provide his medical expertise and treat patients in need of critical care. He spoke seven languages and has seven children, that he called his "bodyguards"!

Doc was the true embodiment of MedShare's mission and desire to provide access to quality healthcare to marginalized communities. He will be missed but his legacy will live on through the example he set and the countless lives he touched.

Through an impact partnership with The Walt Disney Company, MedShare coordinated the distribution of 1 million cloth face masks donated by Disney to children in 151 schools, safety-net clinics and organizations in underserved communities in 20 states throughout every region of the U.S. The masks helped prevent the spread of COVID-19 and protect the most vulnerable children and families in marginalized communities. Among the many extraordinary partners we worked with on this project was UPS employee James Joseph, a.k.a. "Big Brown" (photo, top right), who is wellknown in the Baton Rouge area for his dedication to community service. Through Big Brown and The UPS Foundation's relationship with MedShare, 4,200 Disney face masks for children and 1,000 adult face masks were shipped to Louisiana communities.






